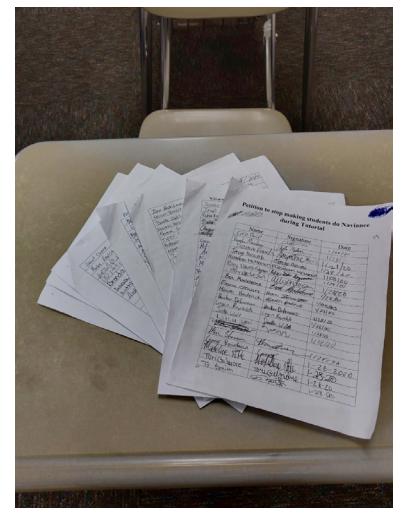

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Naviance Rebellion

Do you hate Naviance tutorials? Do you want them to go away forever? Well, at least 106 of your fellow students do. A petition to end Naviance tutorial sessions has been floating around Mt. Everett and has been racking up signatures left and right. Naviance itself is a beneficial tool to help high school seniors apply to colleges when the time comes. Starting at the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year, high school students were required to participate in bi-weekly Naviance lessons during tutorial, which is what the petition is trying end.

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Naviance sessions during tutorial. Thorpe says that “Naviance is not beneficial to students because they do not take it seriously.” Thorpe thinks it unnecessary for seniors who have already completed the college application process to participate in the Naviance lessons. He also thinks lowerclassmen should not have to participate because of their lack of seriousness and interest. Some other arguments are that much of the material that could be useful can easily be found elsewhere. Marchione said, “The website has proven unreliable; there seem to be new problems every week.”

Naviance was brought in as a learning system to prepare students for global citizenship. It also helps students with social and emotional skill-building, career inventories and searches, and also college readiness. Mt. Everett Guidance Counselor Kimberly Conant says “Naviance, when used correctly, enables us to hit the major life topics and worries that face everyone in today’s world.” Naviance also helps develop career paths and interests while connecting them to academics and the real world. Conant added, “it is often very difficult to push into academic classrooms (as that time is very valuable) to make sure that the curriculum and life skills we want and need to make sure ALL students get exposed to happens. Naviance is helping us to do that in a more streamlined way.”

Many teachers, sensing their student’s dissatisfaction with the lessons, are concerned about

whether it is the best use of time for students that needed the 30-minute tutorial period to get their class-work done. Other teachers believe it to be beneficial for the students. Social Studies teacher John Ham-mill said, “students get out of Naviance what they put into to it.” He explained that some seniors are lost when it comes to the college application process and Naviance lessons could provide sufficient information if taken seriously. Most of the criticism of Naviance is coming from high school students. There is a broad perception that the Naviance middle school lessons are more appropriate and of greater long-term value.

The Bold Eagle is watching the development of this petition and will report any further events stemming from it.

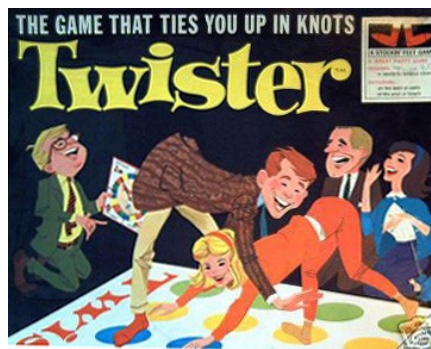

Naviance is a Disappointment

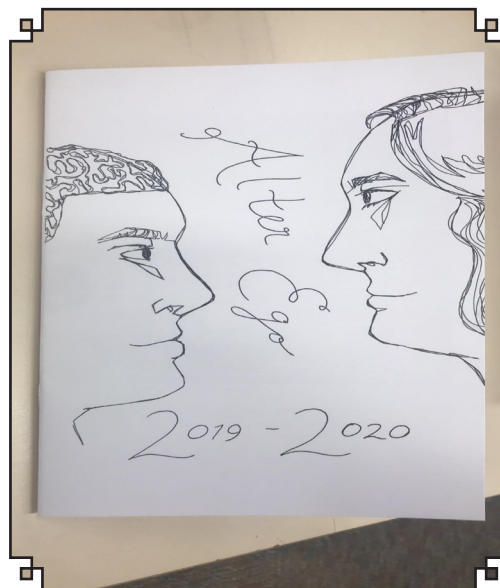

ed States. My sister and I attended
Red Star for two years until it was
time for us to go to Nairobi Ken-
ya, where we would stay until we
boarded our flight to the United
States. We spent two months in
Nairobi trying to get our visas
(United States entry permits), but
that was canceled due to something
that happened to my sister’s visa, so
we had to go back to Kampala to fix
the problem and that took a cou-
ple of more months. In Kampala,
my step-mom’s sister got my sister
and I into a boarding (sleep away)
school, because my dad could not
take care of us while he was trying
to get the problem fixed and work
at the same time.

My sister and I started going to
Christ the King boarding school,
but this was different from anything
we have experienced before. We
would get up early to get breakfast
and then get dressed, and most of
the older kids would help the little
kids to get ready. It was like a big
family. The school was so strict that
if you didn’t follow their rules the
faculty would purposely embarrass
you in front of everyone, just to
teach you a lesson. We had assem-
blies every Monday to make sure
kids were following their rules.

Imagine arriving at school
in Sheffield! What a difference it
was. No religion classes, bullying
is not allowed by students or staff,
and the government gives every-
one a free education. Once we got
comfortable with the English lan-
guage, we were able to adapt, make
friends, learn a lot, and enjoy life
in America. But it sure is different
than what we faced in Uganda.

The website, teachingenglish.org reports that “presentations form a natural part of task-based learning.” This allows students to experiment with real world learning situations. Developing these skills are beneficial to a student’s overall future and current performances in or out of the classroom. Thus, teachers frequently try to include public speaking into their curriculum. Turning presentations into conversations, encouraging team projects, and providing alternative options can make presentations easier on students, while remaining academically significant.

At Mt. Everett, the senior class must deliver speeches in May as part of their regular curriculum. According to English teacher Wendy Casey, “students are as prepared as they choose,” indicating that preparation and practice are the best antidotes to presentation stress. Casey added that “students choose their own topic. Picking something of interest can eliminate stress and increase natural curiosity,” which makes the task more worthwhile.

Other activities support presentation skills. Persuasive essay writing and watching polished public speakers aid in student’s speech delivery. Proper speech etiquette including posture, gestures and breathing techniques are all taught and practiced in class. Most importantly, Casey stated that “students are granted ample time in which to practice delivering their speeches before their assigned evening. During this practice time, class atmosphere is supportive and only positive affirmations are shared.”

DINNER TIME! But if you are too lazy to cook, the Berkshires offers hundreds of restaurant options ranging from fast food to five stars. Whether you are into Chow Mein or burgers and fries, there is no need for a long drive to find a place to eat within your budget.

learned about local history and saw many artifacts.

Perhaps the most surprising occurrence was at a Model U.N. meeting designed to help club members research for an upcoming debate on Hong Kong democracy protests. The intent of the event was for members to ask questions regarding the mass protests in Hong Kong, specifically what the exchange students have seen and how they feel about the movement. However, the students were forbidden by their chaperones to speak on the matter. Instead, the meeting was changed to a general presentation of the club and its activities. According to Graham, the chaperones and their administrators back in Hong Kong believe school should be a safe-learning environment, free from any topics that can be deemed divisive. Several of students had conflicting viewpoints and for this reason, the supervisor felt it wasn't appropriate for them to speak publicly on the matter.

To conclude their final day in America, the students and their host family traveled back to New York City where they visited the Brooklyn Bridge and the Statue of Liberty. Host students bid their farewells as the exchange students boarded their flight to head back home. Freshman and host student Cassie Campeglia said "It was a great experience, I found out me and my [exchange student] had a lot in common. She also got the chance to do stuff she never would be able to do in Hong Kong, like go on a hayride." These types of

opportunities are what make the exchange program so special and the experiences that stem from it make it like no other. Graham says, "I hope that exchange programs like this one become part of our school culture and help bridge the gap between countries to increase inter-cultural understanding and friendship."

Bowling is thought to have been around since 5200 B.C. The Egyptians rolled stones at objects in hopes of knocking them over. "Bowling at pins probably originated in ancient Germany, not as a sport but as a religious ceremony. Martin Luther is credited with settling on nine as the ideal number of pins." Another use was the Polynesian game of ula maika, also utilizing pins and balls of stone. "The stones were to be rolled at targets 60 feet away, a distance which today still is one of the basic regulations of tenpins" says the United States Bowling Congress (USBC).

So, bowling has been around for a while and is a wildly popular sport. The USBC adds, "More than 67 million people in the United States bowl during a year. More than 1.3 million people compete regularly in league play certified by the USBC. Staff at USBC Headquarters in Arlington works closely with its more than 1,600 local and state associations to serve league bowlers."

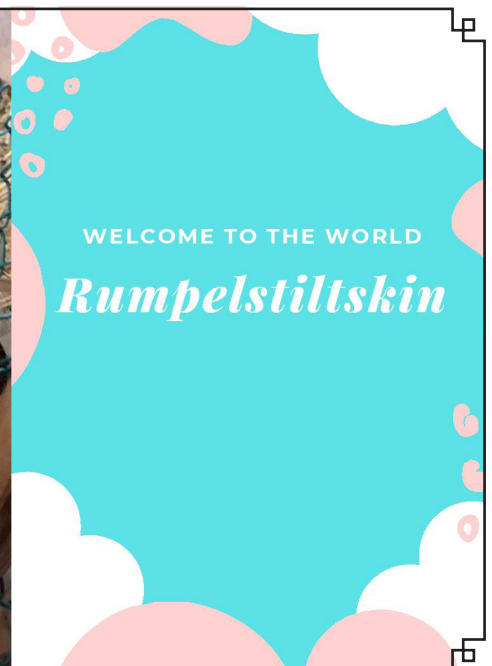

The earbuds are holding by magnet so they are not falling from the case. That's nice. 2. The earbuds feel very comfortable in the ears, for me the default inserts fit well. In the package two additional sizes provided. But this is pretty much standard. Build quality is great nothing feels cheap. 3. The pairing was ready and fast. At the moment you are pulling out the earbuds from the case they are connecting to each other and go to pairing mode. 4. The volume is high, sound is pretty good. I'm not audiophile, but for me they are just great. 5. You can use them in single mode using just left one. 6. Touch interface require to use to it. But works fine. Bottom line - great earbuds!!! Easily recommended." While most people would suspect that these items would be bad, these reviews clearly disagree with those

suspicions.

Onto the Apple Watch side of things. The Janker Smart Watch is currently selling for \$22.39 on Amazon. This watch can apparently do all the same things as an AppleWatch. This item did not set well with their buyers as well as the OZNAKA AirPods did. The Janker Smart Watch currently has an average rating of 3.4 stars out of 5 stars with 46% giving 5 stars, 10% giving 4 stars, 9% for 3 stars, 11% for 2 and a surprising 25% for 1 star. A buyer named John Adams had fairly positive things to say about the watch, "This smart watch is great for the cost and it has good customer service, is great for looks, playing music, calling, and checking the time. The interface is great. Easy to read and when you touch it, it goes to what you want. Also, the customer service is good making the watch reliable if there is any problem." A buyer named Sean was not too pleased with the watch giving a 1 star review: "Wasn't really pleased with this one. The speaker is great and voice over BT

was really useful..... HOWEVER at fully charged it constantly tells me the battery is low. The device doesn't support phonebook transferring...[and suffers from]...outdated software.
